#### **PQMD** Holds Education Forum to Discuss Sustainability, Hold Workshops

#### PQMD to Launch Initiative on Rare Diseases

Access to medicines is particularly challenging for patients living with rare genetic disorders, including in highincome/developed countries, and even after these life-saving treatments have been approved by regulatory authorities and are commercially available.

The challenge is compounded for individuals with rare disorders living in low- and middle-income or resourcelimited countries, because:

- treatment options are not available due to lack of local regulatory approval
- accessibility including distance to treatment centers and overburdened families
- affordability of lifelong treatments
- logistics/supply chain challenges
- long term care resources and healthcare infrastructure (scarcity of diagnostic resources, underresourced healthcare infrastructure a lack of rare disease education amongst clinicians)

To address this important global health issue, PQMD will soon be launching Global Alliances for Rare Diseases (GARD). During the month of November, PQMD will be holding a call with members and other stakeholders to announce next steps. More information will be available soon!

International Medical Corps Provides Psychological First Aid (PFA) Training for First Responders

An earthquake in Haiti, an explosion in Beirut, a global pandemic—all too often, emergencies like these dominate the headlines. Images of razed buildings or crying loved ones, accompanied by what can seem like an ever-increasing death toll, highlight the obvious physical devastation these emergencies can cause. But the "invisible wounds"-the effect an emergency have on a survivor's mental healthcan be just as powerful.

Often neglected, mental health conditions pose a major public health challenge. They affect about <u>one in 10 people</u> <u>during their lifetime</u> <u>globally</u>, and are the <u>leading cause of disability</u> <u>around the world</u>.

This is why International Medical Corps, with the support of its longtime collaborator FedEx, has developed an interactive online training program called "Principles of Psychological First Aid." This unique, scenariobased course takes first responders—or anyone who wants to know more about how to help someone dealing with difficult emotional issues —through a humanitarian emergency and engages them in decisionmaking on how hest to sunnort



BD Unveils Nebraska-Based Manufacturing Capacity to Support U.S. Vaccination Agility and Preparedness

On October 7th, Becton, Dickinson and Company (BD) announced it has strengthened the U.S. government's access to safety injection devices through increased manufacturing capacity and domestic supply. The new syringe and needle manufacturing lines, which were completed on an accelerated timeline, represent the publicprivate partnership between BD and Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response (ASPR).

The new lines increase capacity of BD's existing needle and syringe supply capabilities domestically. To date, the company has provided several hundred million injection devices to the federal campaign. This marks a timely manufacturing milestone as the United States heads into flu vaccination season and the critical need for these essential devices continues.

In addition to ramping up the manufacturing of needles and syringes domestically to meet U.S. needs for the COVID-19 pandemic. BD is working



Janssen Announces Novel Mechanism of Action that Shows Promise Against Dengue in Data Published in *Nature* 

On October 6th, The Janssen Pharmaceutical Companies of Johnson & Johnson (Janssen) announced, in collaboration with the KU Leuven Rega Institute and the KU Leuven Centre for Drug Design and Discovery (CD3), the publication of new preclinical data in the journal Nature showing that an early-stage compound with a novel mechanism of action could potentially treat all serotypes of dengue fever and provide a period of protection against acquiring the dengue virus. Janssen is now moving its dengue program into clinical development.

Named one of the top ten threats in 2019 by the World Health Organization, dengue is critically important to global health security as it infects up to 400 million people, sickens up to 100 million and kills thousands each year. The virus is poised to impact billions more people in the coming decades as the Aedes aegypti mosquito that carries the dengue virus spreads further from its native regions, driven by converging trends like climate change,

those affected.

As it walks the learner through the four main principles of PFA— Prepare, Look, Listen and Link—the course also spells out the importance of self-care for first responders and others who are helping people in stressful situations.

This <u>free two-hour course</u> from International Medical Corps will help to increase the number of trained first responders equipped with the skills needed to meet the mental health needs of individuals, families and communities affected by conflict, disaster or disease.

### **IHP Provides Medications to Support Mental Health in the Middle East**

Mental health treatment and care is needed urgently by people living in Gaza, the West Bank and Lebanon. Their populations live with mounting challenges. Trauma and environmental factors have caused people's mental health to plummet. For many, the largescale effects of bombings and the destruction of homes and facilities are being compounded by daily difficulties. When you don't have money for the basics, can't see a doctor, and can't travel around, life can get very stressful.

In response, IHP is working to provide medications to support mental health in countries such as Palestine and Lebanon. IHP also works with partners such as International Medical Corps, which helps train family doctors in how to provide the best care.
